Hello, all! I'm officially back in the park and excited for the 2024 season. This year kicked off with our small-scale maple sugaring operation and a few pop-up and scheduled programs. This is the first year we've used our new equipment for programming since last year we decided to take some time to practice. We tapped 17 Red Maples, collected around 52 gallons of sap, and finished off with almost a gallon of syrup. I'm planning to take some of the final product to our annual meeting to enter a maple syrup competition, so cross your fingers! Oil Creek maples make some sweet and smooth syrup. If you're interested in helping next year, please reach out. I'd like to eventually open these programs to school groups, but I'll need folks to help me tend the fire and make sure the sap doesn't boil too low.

We have a few other volunteer opportunities coming up as well, including a Pollinator Garden Clean Up day on April 20th. We'll be at the office from 10:00AM to 2:00PM, and folks are welcome to come and go as they need. Bring a lunch and something to drink if you plan to stay all day! We'll have the gloves and garden tools. After that we are planning to have one hour of garden weeding every-other Thursday at 2:00PM starting May 2, so if that's more your speed, I'd love to see you there!

Finally, we are starting to search for a volunteer who may be interested in taking over the care and data-collection of our Bluebird and Tree Swallow nest boxes. This entails assisting with box cleaning, a weekly visit to our nest boxes with provided data sheets, and reporting findings to me at the end of the year. There is a yearly conference for Cavity Nest Volunteers that you'll also be invited to, which is a great learning and networking opportunity!

Another project in the works is our Watershed Education Workshop on May 18th and 19th, which is a professional development opportunity for educators who work with 6-12 grade. We're holding the indoor portion of the workshop at Drake Well, and the outdoor portion in Oil Creek, and we'll be teaching educators how to measure stream health with biological, chemical, and physical data collection. If you are interested or if you know an educator who may want to get involved, feel free to reach out! We are offering 13.5 Act 48 hours for the event, and participants will get a copy of the Watershed Education Curriculum. The workshop costs \$25.

Oil Creek is going to be featured in the Commonwealth Library's Summer Literacy Road Trip for 2024. The program encourages families, educators, and education partners to discover Pennsylvania libraries and State Parks with fun activities and book recommendations. They also create a Travel Journal with resources and activities for each of the featured locations.

Finally, we have public programs scheduled out through the end of April so far, including World Water Day, a National Take a Walk in a Park Day Birding Program, Solar Eclipse Preparation programs, special-topic hikes, and a Fly Fishing 101 program. If you'd like more information on any of these or future programs, they will all be posted on our park Facebook page, the DCNR Calendar of Events website, and in our kiosks throughout the park. I've also got an email list where I send all upcoming program information out monthly. If you'd like to be added, please send me an email.

Geology Hike

Wednesday, April 10 1:00PM-3:00PM Wildcat Hollow

Take a walk with the park naturalist as we go out searching for the American Woodcock, also known as the Timberdoodle or Bogsucker. The male birds spend spring nights dancing high in the sky as they try their best to impress potential partners. Please dress for the weather and bring a flash-light. Hemlock Hike Wednesday, April 17 5:00PM-7:00PM

Egbert Farm Day Use Area

The Eastern Hemlock, Pennsylvania's state tree, has had an incredible history, inspiring works of Emily Dickinson, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, and more. Unfortunately, these striking giants may not be around forever. Join the park naturalist on a 3-mile hike out-and-back to a hemlock grove as we learn about this amazing tree and the issues they face today. This is a difficult hike with steep inclines. Dress for the weather and wear comfortable hiking shoes. Bring water.
